### Epiphany to Ash Wednesday in Liturgical Time

Around the world January 6th is celebrated as The Day of Epiphany, the day designated in celebration of the coming of the magi, the wise men from afar, bearing gifts for the Christ child. Their gifts are signs of the significance of this child for all the world and of that which is to come. Liturgically, we then jump within less than a week from Jesus as a baby to Jesus as an adult! January 10th, known as Baptism of Our Lord, is when we celebrate Jesus' baptism and the voice of God proclaiming, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." Throughout the weeks of the Epiphany season we hear stories that make known to us who this Son is. The season of Sundays after the Epiphany concludes on February 7th, just before we begin Lent, when we hear again the words from heaven, "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" It's a "sandwich" of revelation! This is God's Son come into the world to bring us the promise and hope of new life, both now and eternally.

### Centering Prayer Series

A six-month series following Thomas Keating's video introduction to Centering Prayer will be offered at the Cathedral for members of churches on the square once a month on Sundays at noon. Centering prayer is a popular method of contemplative prayer or Christian meditation, placing a strong emphasis on interior silence. This method of prayer is both a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship.

Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer. Rather, it adds depth of meaning to all prayer and facilitates the movement from more active modes of prayer — verbal, mental or affective prayer — into a receptive prayer of resting in God. Centering Prayer emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God and as a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Him.

The series will start either in Lent or during the summer depending upon the participants' schedules and interest. Contact Pastor Diane for more information.

The moral I am trying to tell you guys right now is that you could be the richest person ever and give a big amount as the extra change you have in your pocket. Or you could be the poorest person ever and give one cent so you have money for today because they may be thinking about themselves before God. But this man gave all he had and the money came from his heart. Because what came from his heart is love for the church and God and love is the difference that matters most. So everyone when you give offerings today it doesn't matter how much you give it matters if it comes from your heart.
