From the Rector

14I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. 15If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery.’ Numbers 11:14-15



That was Moses who had been trying to lead, guide, and cajole the people through the wilderness. The needs were many, the people were demanding, and Moses had had enough. He cried out to God with more than a bit of exasperation. Well, of course!

Moses had been trying to “carry” this people on his own. God instructed him to gather up seventy elders to assist him. As I often hear our Senior Warden say, “Many hands make for light work.”

Over the past few years the leadership of this congregation has grown and expanded. People are increasingly finding ways to contribute to the mission of this church, and we continue to seek more people interested in serving as leaders and visionaries for this congregation. That’s important because the church *is* the people.

Now, St. Peter's has a new and exciting leadership opportunity that has opened to us. At the January Annual Meeting, we mentioned that the Bishop's Office was seeking curate placements for two seminarians graduating this month. We submitted St. Peter’s as a possible placement site. After the Executive Committee Skyped with Jazzy Bostock (Could there be a better named curate for a church that has Jazz Vespers?!) and unanimously felt that she would be a good fit for St. Peter’s, the Bishop informed us that he and Jazzy mutually agreed that her placement for the next two years will be at St. Peter’s! Jazzy is from Hawaii and has had an array of interesting experiences. She graduates from Yale Divinity School on Monday, May 21st. She will be ordained to the transitional diaconate, the preparatory step to the priesthood, on **Saturday, June 9th at St. Andrew’s Cathedral** along with five others, including Preston Lentz, who served as an intern at St. Peter’s, and Ha'aheo Guanson who has been active in our Jazz Vespers ministry.

Jazzy’s first Sunday with us will be **June 17th**. She will be involved in the Word and Sacrament ministry of this church—

preaching and celebrating Eucharist, but she will also provide additional needed support to our newcomer ministry, our children and youth programming, our sick and homebound visitations, and our faith and justice outreach into the community.

We will all be learning more about Jazzy in the months to come and we look forward to meeting her. In the meantime, please take a moment to read her letter of introduction below, and keep her in your prayers as she finishes up her studies and looks ahead to graduation!

Dear St. Peter's,

Kauai Disaster Relief Update

Christ Memorial Episcopal Church on Kaua'i has been identified as an official site to receive financial donations for flood relief. Christ Memorial, located in Kilauea, suffered no damage.

Christ Memorial has a thrift shop and hosts a food bank that serves the north shore of Kaua'i. Both of these ministries are important to the impacted community. Individuals and families related to the congregation were impacted.

All funds donated will be used by the congregation's priest, the Rev. Gae Chalker, to aid organizations addressing the needs of the community and individuals impacted by the flood.

As with all church funds, their use will be reviewed by the Wardens and audited.



A Message from the Office of the Bishop

Aloha,

I have been asked about providing Church funds or soliciting special donations to help Peter Pereira with his out-of-pocket medical expenses. By special action of Diocesan Council, Peter continues on the Office of the Bishop staff at full compensation and benefits for the first four months of his recovery, and will continue receiving both with a sabbatical leave of one month after those four months, if necessary.

Taking a special collection is problematic. Because he is an employee and a corporate officer, the Episcopal Church in Hawai'i cannot receive donations to pass to Peter. Gifts cannot be received by our churches (or our office) for the benefit of any individual in a way that permits the donor to take a tax deduction or that mitigates the tax burden on the employee. All of this makes receiving gifts/donations for Peter through the Episcopal Church (including congregations) difficult without tax implications for all involved. It was suggested that Peter set up a "GoFundMe" campaign, which he researched and has decided not to set up.

On Peter's instruction, and with his permission to share his home address, individuals may send cards and personal gifts to him directly to his home. Congregational and Diocesan leaders may share this information as they think appropriate. Due to the reasons listed above, there can be no formal appeal from the Office of the Bishop or by churches.

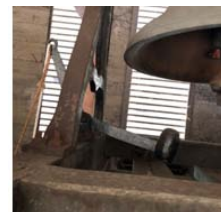

Another method to ring the bell is to pull the less thick, beige rope which causes the internal hammer to strike the inside of the bell. The bell remains still and does not swing.

NEVER pull on both ropes at the same time as this will cause serious damage to the bell.

If you would like to be a Bell Ringer, please see either Keith or me so we can properly train you to ring our church bell.

The Junior Warden's Corner

The Bell Rings Again!

The acolytes ring our church bell to call the faithful to worship, signaling the start of the worship service. You hear it, but have you ever wondered what's up there in the Bell Tower? Are there one or two bells up there? Not many are



able or willing to climb up a 25 foot bouncy aluminum extension ladder to find out! So, here's a description and photos of the bell that Oriel Agcaoli (our Sexton), Keith Lee, and I

saw on a recent Saturday.

There is one bell with two ropes! The bell is suspended from a headstock which swings on bearings. A thick white rope is tied to a wheel on the headstock and hangs down to the bell ringer. To ring the bell, the acolyte ringer pulls on this large rope, swinging the bell. The motion causes the clapper to strike the inside of the bell rim as it swings, thereby sounding the bell.



Busy Bags and Bulletin Boards...

March saw the refreshed and renewed busy bags for the enrichment of the youngest among us. These colorful bags you see are hanging on big plastic hooks on the back of the pew nearest the baptismal font. Families with small children are encouraged to pick one off the hook and offer it to their toddlers for them to explore. There will always be a small toy and a book (after all Episcopalians are known as people of the book). After the service the bags are returned to a collection basket near where they were picked up and are sanitized after each use.

In May, "Beginners Bulletin Boards" will also be available. These are designed for the early school aged child and older. These colorful clipboards will have the most current issue of the "Sunday Paper Junior" and a Children's Bulletin chosen for each Sunday. The "Sunday Paper Junior" will illustrate, with drawings and script, one or more of that Sunday's readings. The Children's Bulletin (we have been using this for some time now) has puzzles and questions relating to the lesson also. Inside the clipboard are also colored pencils and a note pad. The young people are invited to take

their “papers” home with them. After the service they are asked to return their “Beginners Bulletin Boards” to the box where they were picked up. An added bonus to the “Sunday Paper Jr.s” is a open letter to the child’s caregivers with each issue. This back page contains further commentary on the lessons of the week, seasonal comments and words of wisdom from one experienced child centered adult to another.

Providing child-friendly material is not simply for entertainment purposes, or to give a restless little one some diversion, it is broader and deeper than that. First, we are a faith that values the written Word, and what word is more important than *the* Word. Children can learn to revere and respect the Word of God by observing their families as they use their prayer books and hymnals and by hearing The Word read from our appointed lessons.

Another reason for providing this child appropriate material is that of hospitality. To truly feel welcome in a place, it is important to have outward and visible signs that the community has given thought to the comfort of those present, that all are welcome.

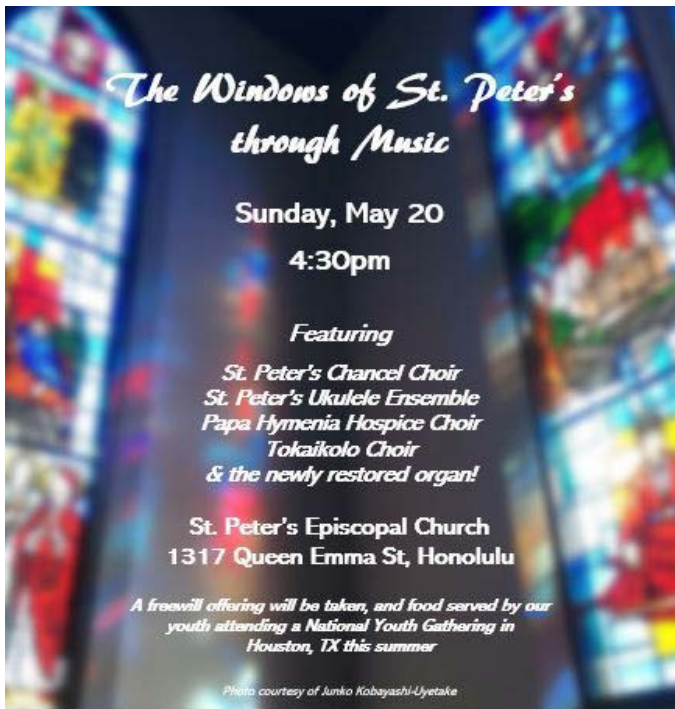
