
As we enter 2023, let us watch, listen, and trust in the signs of God's presence and promise in our lives.

Annual Meeting of the Parish Sunday, January 29, 8:45 AM in person in the Sanctuary and by Zoom

The Parish of St. Peter's Episcopal Church meets once a year to review the year past, look ahead to the coming year, and to conduct any necessary business. This year we will be voting for three new Vestry members, a new Junior Warden, and ten delegates for Diocesan Convention which takes place the end of October. In the Episcopal Church, budget work is conducted and approved by the Vestry. That work will be completed at the January Vestry meeting on January 18th. The approved budget for 2023 will be included in the Annual Report and presented at the Annual Meeting of the Parish.

This year we will once again hold a "hybrid" meeting with both "in person" participation in the sanctuary as well as a Zoom option for those at home. The Sunday prior, January 22nd, will be an opportunity to look at the 2022 Annual Report, check your Zoom connection, and ask any questions.

Besides the need to have a quorum, the Annual Meeting is a great time to connect as a community across our multiple service times. Please mark your calendar!



Is God calling you to leadership in the church? St. Peter's Annual Meeting is the last Sunday of January. At that meeting, we will be electing a new Junior Warden, three new Vestry members (Vestry members serve for three-year terms), and five Diocesan Convention delegates along with five alternates.

Junior Warden - The Jr. Warden oversees care of the property. You do not need to be a handy person, but rather someone who is good at oversight and coordinating care and repairs of the buildings. The Jr. Warden also serves as a member of the Executive Committee which provides counsel and direction between Vestry meetings.

Vestry Members - There are twelve members on St. Peter's Vestry who rotate on every three years. Vestry members provide vision and direction to the congregation in following its mission, ensuring effective organization and planning, and in managing the church's resources and finances. Since the pandemic, Vestry meetings have been held over Zoom.

Diocesan Convention Delegates - Diocesan Convention is on a Saturday near the end of October, although the congregation votes for the delegates in January. The Diocese allows five delegates from St. Peter's, and the St. Peter's by-laws require an alternate for each delegate. General Convention is when the business of the Diocese takes place and is an opportunity to gain broader awareness of the work of the Diocese.

Please prayerfully consider if God is calling you to one of the positions above. Speak with Pastor Diane or any of our Vestry members about these possibilities.

Thank you to All who have made a pledge for 2023! Your pledge is greatly appreciated and necessary in guiding the Vestry in its budget preparation for 2023. A pledge is your anticipated monetary commitment to the ministry of this church in the coming year. It is a recognition of God's blessings in your life and your participation in blessing others by being part of God's work in the world through this church. People give in many different ways—weekly, monthly, quarterly, all at once upfront or at the end of the year; by check, electronically, or by distribution from a fund. Your



pledge card is where you can indicate the frequency, means, and amount you plan to give in 2023.

The Budget Committee reviews the total amounts, plans a budget, and has a roadmap for spending in the year to come. Thank you for your generosity and participation in the

Did you know that the "Shopping Cart Good Samaritan" is descended from one of the original founding families of St. Peter's Church?

That's right! Josh Baldovi is the son of Valerie Baldovi and a part of the Yap 'Ohana. If you watch the local TV news, you may have seen Josh. Beginning in August 2021, Josh began noticing that there were an increasing number of abandoned shopping carts in his Kāne'ohe neighborhood, so much so that he couldn't even walk down his sidewalk without bumping into them. He decided to do something about it and began returning the carts to their rightful owners. Today he is still at it. He drives his truck around Kāne'ohe every day and estimates that he walks more than two miles every day.



He has returned over 500 abandoned shopping carts and when they are "trashed" he cleans and disinfects them. Not only is this an incredible service to the neighborhood, but with shopping carts costing \$150 to \$250, it is a significant savings for the businesses he has assisted—all volunteer work out of the goodness of his heart. He has also taken loads of junk to the dump. Way to go, Josh! You truly bring to life what it means to be a Good Samaritan within our community!

Food Donations for Food Insecure UH Students

The University of Hawai'i has begun a "Food Vault" (FVH) to address the increased food insecurity of their students. In partnership with the Cathedral, we will have an ongoing collection of non-perishable, unopened, unexpired food for FVH (similar to our ongoing collection of toiletries for Wallyhouse). Watch for the sales and drop off your donations on Sundays or in the church office during the week. Once a month the collected food items will be taken to the Cathedral for pick-up by FVH. Especially popular with the students are the following:

Canned meats (spam, chicken, tuna, salmon, corned beef, vienna sausage), canned beans (garbanzo, black, kidney, pork and beans, refried beans), canned vegetables/fruit, canned meals (stew, spaghetti, chili, chowder), canned soups and broth, packaged pasta (esp. spinach, wheat, etc.), tomato and meat sauces, 2-5 lb. bags of rice, cup noodles/instant noodles/saimin/ramen, Mac N Cheese (ready to make), peanut butter, jam/jelly/honey, dried beans/lentils, mini boxes of cereal, granola, oatmeal, nuts.
