From the Rector



This past week, I heard a teen express what he saw as the challenge of our times. He said, "Too many people think—that person doesn't look like me, that person doesn't talk like me—and then jump to the conclusion, That person doesn't have as much to contribute to this country as I do."

That's a pretty astute observation. It is a sentiment that is certainly not expressed just in this country. It has popped up all over the world—and throughout history all the way

back to Biblical times. And, that can seem discouraging. Haven't we been through all this before? Yes, we have, and it never ends well. It seems to be a fundamental part of the sinful nature we call "human." And, yet, God does not give up on us. Throughout the Bible, God remains tenaciously persistent in calling us to something better—leading those who are oppressed out of bondage and calling for a change of hearts when we wander down the wrong path. In the Apostle Paul's letter to the Romans, he reminds us that we are one body—no divisions, no labels—one body, and each of us, individually members of that one body, *all* of whom have gifts to contribute to the well-being of our life together (Romans 12:5-6).

We are seeing that in the response to the destruction caused by Hurricane Harvey. An impressive list of some 22 governmental agencies and the American Red Cross, all had action plans in place before Hurricane Harvey made landfall—everything from setting up collection sites with water, meals, blankets, generators, and other supplies, mobile emergency communication networks, overnight shelters, stockpiling of flood-fighting materials, assistance for Gulf of Mexico oil and gas activities, manpower for debris removal and volunteer and donations management, preparation for rapid water assessment and emergency fuel supplies, 460 deployed medical personnel—doctors, nurses, and others in addition to those already there along with the establishment of a Disaster Distress Helpline to aid with behavioral health needs, readiness to transport hazardous materials, and even putting the National Flood Insurance Program at the ready to process flood damage claims as well as placement of sensors by the U.S. Geological agency to monitor flood and wind patterns to aid in preparations for future hurricanes. All of these agencies of our government-which, by the way, is all of us-were working together to aid humanity; all of us, united as a country to help those hit by the force of this hurricane. That's a good thing because the flooding from Hurricane Harvey has turned out to be far worse than most imagined was possible, but that has caused even more people to want to reach out and help. It shouldn't just be when disaster strikes that we see the best of human nature, but that does seem to be a time when the

divisions we construct begin to fall away and we see one another as God sees us—each of us a human being created in God's image.

St. Paul wrote. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God-what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2) God's story throughout the Bible and certainly through the life of Jesus, the Messiah, the Son of the living God, is that God is with us through thick and thin, through glory and shame. always desiring and working to transform our lives more completely in the way revealed through Jesus Christ, helping us to better understand what it means to be one body and individually members one of another and to appreciate one another's unique gifts that enrich all our lives within community.

The power of Christianity is the freeing grace from false constructs of identity and power. In Christianity, there is no Jew or Greek, male or female, slave or free. Our sole identity is that of beloved child of God, and rather than engaging in a power struggle among different "groups," we are called to be servants of God in this world. This is a fundamental truth about the way of God that we humans have struggled to learn throughout the generations. It's a message the church needs to continue to proclaim today. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God-what is good and acceptable and perfect. May God make it so.

Richard Sui On Chang, IV Bishop of Hawai'i

The Rt. Rev. Richard Sui On Chang, the fourth bishop of the <u>Diocese of</u> <u>Hawaii</u>, died Aug. 30 after a short illness. Chang served from 1997 to 2006.



Chang earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut, and a Master of Divinity degree from Church Divinity School of the Pacific, the Episcopal seminary in Berkeley, California. He also studied at the University of Hawaii.

George Richard Millard, the suffragan bishop of the Diocese of California, ordained Chang to the diaconate in March 1966. Then-Bishop of Hawaii Harry S. Kennedy ordained him to the priesthood six months later.

Chang served in several roles in Hawaii before becoming the diocese's archdeacon from 1970 to 1974. After the first bishop of Hawaii, the Rt. Rev. Edmond Browning was installed as the Episcopal Church's 24th presiding bishop, Chang served as his assistant. He was the executive officer of the diocese when Browning was bishop in Hawaii.

Chang served for a time as vice president of the House of Bishops.

He is survived by his wife, Delia Chang, and daughters Holly and Hannah. A Celebration of Life wil be held Sunday, September 17 at the Cathedral. Visitation is from 2-4 p.m. The service will begin at 4 p.m. A reception will follow. Notes of condolence may be sent to the Office of the Bishop addressed to:

HHF Grant and Window Work

Great news! Thanks to time-consuming work by Ruth Merz, who made application on St. Peter's behalf, the church has been awarded a \$55,000 Freeman grant through the Historic Hawai`i Foundation to repair the wooden stained glass window frames in the Bell Tower as well as money toward our capital campaign for the new cross on the lower front steeple and a percentage of the exterior painting.

The award came none too soon because we had a recent jolt when it was discovered that three of the Bell Tower windows were sagging due to termite munching and wood rot from pooled water in the bottom sills. Jim Erickson and Jim Harvey jumped into action, removing the lower stained glass window panels for safe keeping while Jim Harvey milled new sills. Soon the windows were back in again! With all the work completed, a final report will be written up for the Historic Hawai`i Foundation for the funds to be released.

Please give Ruth a huge Mahalo for all her work which has brought in much needed funds for this renovation work!

September's Schedule for Godly Play:

Sept. 3 Children, youth, and parents are welcome to visit the classrooms and register their children.

Sept. 10 Timeline of the apostles and saints. The lesson focuses on how Christ's message lives on through the actions of apostles and saints. By looking at the lives of apostles and saints over the centuries, we see how people like you and I can help others feel Christ's presence in our actions.

Sept. 17 Jesus and the Twelve. We learn more about the twelve disciples of Jesus, the first apostles to spread Christ's message to the world. We hear their names and learn a little about their lives and the symbols used to represent them. If you had a symbol to represent the essence of your life, what might it be?

Sept. 24 The All Saints Lesson. In our Episcopal/Anglican tradition, we trust that each of us is a member of the Communion of Saints just by virtue of being one of God's children. The symbol in the story is a mirror, an invitation to remember that God loves each of us just the way we are. And yet, we are called to try to be our best selves in everyday life.
