

Support our Neighborhood Middle School!

DonorsChoose is a non-profit organization that connects the public to public schools. It makes it easy for anyone to help a classroom in need, and is making it easy for St. Peter's to support Central Middle School!

As you may know, the majority of Central Middle School students reside in government and affordable housing complexes or transitional and homeless shelters, while others live with relatives or in multigenerational homes. More than three quarters of the students live in low-income households.

The DonorsChoose CMS projects include Personal Hygiene Packs and snacks.

Personal Hygiene Packs: In PE, students are competitive and enjoy getting outside and having fun while sweating a lot. They may also have body odor they never used to have and many of them are too embarrassed or poor to buy deodorant. Unfortunately, sometimes these odors can be a distraction to learning or become a cause for bullying or teasing. The PE teacher, Mrs Patton, would love to give them the peace of mind of having the personal hygiene essentials they can keep in their backpacks to use during school.

Snacks: The second CMS DonorsChoose project, also submitted by Mrs Patton, would provide healthy snacks to students who arrive late to school and miss the school breakfast. Once they are fed, they will be able to focus on the teachers' instruction. Often times, the students lack focus in the classroom because they are hungry.

Church-wide Epiphany Bible Reading Initiative Begins January 7, 2019

Forward Movement, along with partners from across the Episcopal Church, invites all Episcopalians to participate in the **Good Book Club**, a church-wide Bible reading initiative. The **Good Book Club** will focus on Paul's Letter to the Romans, with participants reading a section of scripture each day during the Epiphany season, starting on January 7, 2019.

ChurchNext, a ministry of Forward Movement, will offer two six-week live Bible studies led by the Rev. Jay Sidebotham, author of *Conversations with Scripture:* Romans and director of RenewalWorks. The studies can be found at http://www.goodbookclub.org.

"When we commit ourselves to reading God's Word, we open ourselves to the opportunity for transformation," said Richelle Thompson, deputy director and managing editor of Forward Movement. "Although Paul wrote this letter to the Romans, the message of salvation and redemption through the risen Christ is one we all need to hear and embrace today."

The **Good Book Club** began during Lent and Easter of 2018 with tens of thousands of Episcopalians reading the Gospel of Luke and the Book of Acts. Survey results from participants showed a hunger and desire to continue the initiative and provide more opportunities for people to read and discuss scripture together. Romans was the first choice of participants for the next **Good Book Club**.

Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry supports and encourages individuals and congregations to join the **Good Book Club** as a way to engage in "Learn," one of the seven Way of Love practices for a Jesuscentered life (Go

St. Peter's Church: A Beacon of Hope

Thoughts from members of the vestry

I am Barry Wood, a member of the vestry. Pastor Diane asked me to "Share from the heart: Why I support this church; why it's important for me to be part of a faith community." As a relatively recent returning member of St Peter's, and a brand new member of the vestry; honestly, I didn't pay that much attention to the 'mission statement.' So, I thought I should do some research first. I've been involved with mission statements in other organizations, but never for a church.

The following are brief excerpts about mission statements. A statement to convey your organization's reason for being to your staff, board, stakeholders and members of the community. Each statement should be clear, powerful, and broad enough to guide your decision-making and help explain your organization's efforts to potential investors and funders. I'm sure those involved in writing St Peter's mission statement took time and care in choosing just the right words, concise and specific, vibrant and exciting...really clear about its passion and values...to create dynamic, visual images and inspire action...focused on what the church does and its objectives. I also looked up the words, 'beacon' and 'hope'. For beacon the two that resonated best with me were: one: 'a lighthouse or other signal for guidance'; and two: 'a source of light or inspiration.' I'm reminded of words from Matthew Chap 5: Verses 14-16: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." For 'hope', the definition - 'desire accompanied by expectation of or belief in fulfillment' - seemed to fit best.

With all that said, I believe St Peter's is a beacon of hope to help fulfill my spiritual needs to become a better God-centered Christian, to follow His lead and accept His will in everything I do. I also believe this is St. Peter's mission for the congregation as a whole. Thus, my desire is that St. Peter's congregation can be a beacon of hope for the greater community outside this sanctuary. It's a challenge with potential risks since being a vocal Christian in today's world can be much more dangerous than when I was a youngster coming to St. Peter's.

In closing, I am inspired by words from my favorite hymn that we used to sing every Sunday before leaving the parish hall: *Onward Christian soldiers, marching as to war with the cross of Jesus going on before.*

Thank you for being here this morning.

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I am Nancy Rowe, a member of the vestry and church treasurer. A Beacon of Hope? My guess is that people come to church seeking that hope - when they are facing life's challenges; when the children are old enough for Sunday School, when they are celebrating life's joys; or... We came to St. Peter's hoping to find a faith community, and we found you.

St. Peter's offers hope through preaching, teaching, fellowship, care, prayer. We receive that hope and carry it into the community where we live or work. Hope flows out when lunch is prepared and served to Habitat volunteers; when sack lunches are served to the clients of Hie Hie, when food is collected for Kuhio Park Terrace, when support is offered to Central Middle School. Hope flows out when we care for and about each other, pray for each other, are community.

The church renovation project was a witness that St. Peter's presence into the next generations is important to us. Our continued support of St, Peter's makes ministry happen here. I invite you to be part of the circle of hope and service as you consider your pledge to the 2019 commitment campaign.

St. Peter's Church: A Call to Serve

This ministry has grown not only by St Peter's Ohana but more so by non-St Peter's members participation and generous contributions. It is amazing how many people are coming back on their annual vacation time and want to help/participate. You should come to see/feel the camaraderie.

Bill and I decided to become involved in Hie Hie Ministry. We only participated once, but we feel this is the project we need to do in serving Christ. I ask everyone to participate and get involved in serving Christ because this is our church and we are one Ohana. Thank you.

I am Jaime Yamane and am serving my second year as a Vestry member. Let's go back a few years ago. At the time, I was searching for a new church that would not only be a place of worship, but also an opportunity to serve. Before I visited St. Peter's for the first time, I looked at the website and happily discovered that this congregation is involved with many outreach ministries. I dabbled in a few areas and realized that it is true that our congregation is really good at cooking and feeding people! Habitat for Humanity, Family Promise, Soul Food Ministry and Jazz Vespers are just some of the ways we provide nourishment to the community. Over the next couple of years I also learned that besides outreach, there are many opportunities to serve right within our own church. We are a community and it does "take a village" to make this church function smoothly. St. Peter's really needs every member to share their respective talents in order for our church to continue to make strides in implementing new programs, keeping the facilities in top shape as well as serving God and spreading his message.

If I can be perfectly candid, when I first studied the "Time and Talent" survey, I didn't really think I had concrete skills that our church would need.

However, after I started serving on the vestry, I realized that our needs are varied and things arise that you'd never expect... and you discover that you actually CAN contribute. I would have never dreamed that my knowledge of a horrible topic like termites would come in handy, or that my passion for design would be of use during the renovation. And as it turns out, previous experience in finance is also being put to use. Recently, through the recommendation from Pastor Diane, I was appointed by Bishop Bob to a three year term on the newly created Commission for Investments for the Diocese.

Looking back, the little ways in which I have served seem so random, but I continue to try and follow where God leads me. It is my hope that each one of us takes Peter's message to heart. "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."
