Perhaps you have heard the phrase, "have an attitude of gratitude" – either from a parent, a teacher, or perhaps even in a marketing campaign. This month perhaps gratitude is in the forefront of your mind, as we head towards Thanksgiving. Pastor Diane recently shared something with me which has given me pause for thought – gratitude is not just an inclination,

but it is a practice, fueled by daily observances.

I say grace before eating my dinner meal – always aloud when I am eating with someone else, sometimes silently when I am alone. This small practice gives me a space to practice gratitude in the day. And, particularly when I have had a bad day, I realize how important this discipline is. Sometimes when I bow my head, I can't think of anything to say – until I think of things to be grateful for. Even if I start with the basics (a roof over my head, food to eat) – I realize that there is actually a lot to be thankful for (the way the sun glints off the plants on my balcony, or the soft purring of my cat). This is one way to practice gratitude – to make it a habitual, daily discipline and not just a fleeting feeling.

Another way I practice my gratitude is through giving. In our first service, at the time the gifts are brought forward, the offering bowls are lifted up and we say together, "All things come of thee O Lord, and of Thine own have we given Thee". The theology in this statement touches me – I am given all that I have through and by God's goodness. Gifting it back to the church, which is helping to do God's work in the world, is really only giving back to God what is and has always been God's.

This month, I hope and pray that you will find, as you look around, much to be grateful for. I hope that in seeing this abundance, you see God's goodness. As part of your grateful response to God's goodness in the world, I invite you to consider contributing, through a pledge, to the mission of this church. Perhaps your pledge can be a daily discipline, bringing gratitude into your life.

50th Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Diocese of Honolulu October 26-27, 2018, Kona, Hawaii

The 50th Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawai'i was held on October 26-27, 2018, in Kailua-Kona, Hawaii, with Pastor Diane Martinson, Curate Jazzy Bostock, and elected delegates Michelle Baldovi, Melvin Kau, Velma Lee, Ruth D. Merz, and Tim Yuen in attendance. Many thanks to our lay delegates for so ably representing St. Peter's at this year's Diocesan Convention. The word "fun" isn't always associated with Convention, but we really did have a fun time with one another and with our sisters and brothers from across the diocese!

#### **Education Day:**

On Friday's Convention "Education Day", instead of everyone being told as usual to turn "OFF" all their electronic devices, attendees were instructed to turn them "ON" instead, and were given step by step orientation into the interactive software that would enable all delegates to access the daily schedules, presentations, voting biographies and ballots for elections, financial documents, budgets, resolutions, Bishop's letter, and all other handouts for the convention electronically, instead of being printed out in a hard binder as usual.

Once everyone had gained electronic access, the work and findings of the three Design Teams (Spiritual Growth, `Ohana, and Communications) were presented, with Pastor Diane being a member of the `Ohana Design Group. From 10AM-3PM, each group introduced their members, presented their tasks and scope of work, and demonstrated their findings and outcomes through trainings, presentations with visuals, small breakout groups, games with prizes, bon dancing

in the aisles, and a Spirit-filled, small group prayer section. Instructions on how to use Instagram, Facebook, Twitter and other forms of media communication for enhancing church outreach, were also presented. The day ended with the Opening Eucharist Service, followed by an Aloha Reception Dinner on the outdoor luau grounds of the King Kamehameha Kona Beach Hotel.

#### **Bishop's Address to Convention:**

Do we want others to know Jesus? That is the question Bishop Bob challenged us to consider. Some, he said, worry about the future of the church, but, he said, this is God's church and if we really believe that Jesus is important, that Jesus transforms lives, and if we really want others to know how much God loves them and the power of Jesus' love in this world, we needn't worry. The church will grow. But, it's up to us.

He pointed out that folks only invite others to something they love and value. Do we love and value our faith? Our church? Bishop Bob witnessed to his own faith, "I know Jesus Christ is my Lord and Savior. It has been the greatest joy of my life to share that faith with others. I receive that love every day of my life. I want everyone to know that love and to share that love—to be free from pain, to know that you are loved just as you are." He pointed to Romans 8 which gives us hope in the grace that God has for us in the face of our weaknesses and failings and that we truly do have a "loving, liberating, life-giving God" as Presiding Bishop Curry is fond of saying.

Bishop Bob asked us to consider: Is our church a place of faith, welcome, joy, renewal? When someone walks into church on Sunday, do we believe that this person's

life will be changed? God's love has that power assured Bishop Bob, and he urged us to pray with one another for that love to be made known.

#### **Budget:**

During the medical leave of our Diocesan Treasurer, Peter Pereira, the budget was developed by Rae Costa (business manager), Danny Casey (bookkeeper), and the Diocesan Council. Dixie Kaetsu presented the resolution and the proposed budget to the delegates for approval.

In the 2019 approved budget, certain items were increased and then lowered for 2020 and 2021 because projections may change after the actual costs of each item are calculated next year. An example is increased support for Camp Mokuleia in 2019 in an effort to boost development of programming to benefit the congregations of the diocese. The impact of this additional support in 2019 will be evaluated before considering similar increases in subsequent years. Also, some items have reserves in anticipation of certain expenses in the coming years (i.e. Episcopal Youth Event; Lambeth Conference) so that when the item is needed, the price won't seem so costly.

#### Four Resolutions Introduced:

Resolution #1: 2019 Minimum Clergy Compensation and Benefits Policy of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii, submitted by the Diocesan Clergy Compensation Review Committee. This is a proposed resolution presented yearly per the canons of the church. Amendments to the resolution, as approved for 2019 include: 1) a 2% increase in compensation per a 2.6% consumer price index increase in Hawaii, 2) If both spouses are employed by the Diocese, they are limited to a combined total of 16 workweeks of paid Parental Leave to match the 8 weeks granted to a clergyperson solely employed by the Diocese, and 3) value of church-provided housing will established on a case-by-case basis.

Resolution #2: Failure on DACA Would Stain the U.S., submitted and introduced by Melvin E. Kau of St. Peters: The resolution asks that the 50th Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii support the immediate passage of federal legislation for a clean Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) or Dream Act, that provides a pathway for education, work, and protected status for young people brought to the United States as minors and protects their custodial families from detention and deportation. After four amendments were passed, which in essence were restructuring and rewordings of the original Resolution #2, the resolution was passed.

Resolution #3: Taking a Stand Against Abuse in All Its Forms, submitted and introduced by Fran Kramer. Two forms of this amendment were present—

#3, the original resolution and #3B, which was rewritten by the Standing Committee and recommended to replace the original Resolution #3. The author of Resolution #3 rejected the proposed #3B because she felt #3B was too limited for the scope she was trying to achieve in Resolution #3. After much discussion in an effort to merge the two proposed resolutions, a motion was made, seconded and passed to table the consideration of Resolution #3 and #3B, sending it back to the Standing Committee.

Resolution #4: Creation Care, submitted by Rev. David Kennedy. Resolution #4 was adopted as presented.

#### **Reports at Convention:**

#### St. Andrew's Priory

Did you know that St. Andrew's Priory is the only Diocesan school in Hawai'i? However, no financial support for operations is received from the Diocese. Founded in 1867 by Queen Emma, the school across the square has been changing with the times, but continues its mission to "actively engage and educate students in a culture of care, love, and service".

The Head of School, Ruth R. Fletcher, Ph.D spoke at the recent 50<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Convention and shared that the school continually honors its founder & benefactor, Queen Emma, through its enriching programs and challenging curricula. Originally founded to provide young women access to a quality education once only provided to boys, the priory has now expanded its educational programs to include the following: The Queen Emma Preschool (Boys and Girls): located off of Pali Highway

The Prep: Boys K-6 (Opened in 2014)

The Priory (Girls K-12): Lower Schools K-5; Upper

School: 6-12

The school is still very much rooted in the Episcopal tradition, although the school is inclusive of all faiths. Weekly and monthly chapel services are led by the school's full-time chaplain, our very own The Rev. Annalise Pasalo! For more information, please visit www.standrewsschools.org

Commemorating Queen Lili'uokalani's Death November 11, 1917

> With the Cathedral Choir and special guests Nā Wai Chamber Choir

A special Evensong on will be offered on Sunday, November 11<sup>th</sup> (5:30 PM) at the Cathedral of St. Andrew, Honolulu, to commemorate the 101<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the death of Queen Lili'uokalani. In keeping with

historic Church practice, this commemoration is observed on November 11<sup>th</sup> as the date of the Queen's death, and, therefore, when she entered into the greater glory of God and the communion of saints.

The Episcopal Church's liturgical calendar currently authorizes commemoration of Queen Lili`uokalani for local use on this day. The Hawai'i Diocese has resolved to encourage Queen Lili'uokalani's inclusion in the general liturgical calendar for the entire Church. Towards this end, the Bishop will work with the Native Hawaiian Ministry Committee to develop liturgical resources for the commemoration that can be shared nationally and internationally. The diocese will also be developing a case for why the Queen should be a witness to the whole Church, more than just locally. Commemoration and Presentation to the General Convention is anticipated in 2021 or 2024. If you are interested in working on this project, please speak with Bishop Bob by contacting the Diocesan Support Center, formerly known as the Office of the Bishop.

#### Capital Campaign Update



Many thanks to those who have continued to support St. Peter's Capital Campaign. The total cost of the 2017 church repair and renovation project was \$809,050.00.

\$150,000 of the funding came from church reserves with the balance donated or pledged through the three -year capital campaign. St. Peter's took out a construction loan of \$252,000 to cover the construction costs while capital campaign gifts are being received. As of the end of October the balance on the loan was \$76,786. Payments toward principal are made each month as monies come in thereby lowering the monthly interest payments on this loan. New gifts are always welcome. Thank you!
