



Willis Yap

As a Vietnam Vet, Willis Yap was selected to be part of the Honor Flight program which took him and 24 other veterans on an allexpense paid trip to Washington, D.C. in early August. Beginning the trip in Honolulu, they were sent on their way by Mazie Hirono and Lt. Gov. Sylvia Luke along with Hawaiian

musicians and hula dancers. Willis wrote of their experience, "We departed HNL on a Monday afternoon after a two hour flight delay and arrived at 2:00am in Portland, OR, where we were greeted by a delegation of 'honor guard' volunteers carrying flags and welcoming signs. They obviously had been there for at least three hours. Likewise, every time we arrived anywhere there was always a delegation to greet us with signs, music, cheers. To some veterans, it was quite a contrast to their original arrivals in the U.S.A. after Vietnam when protestors booed and actually spit on them. But that's another story." To Willis and all our veterans, especially those who served during the difficult period of the Vietnam War, thank you for your service!

Leila Diamond

In addition to photography, Leila Diamond is also a Sogetsu Ikebana floral artist. She has been studying the art form since 2003. Sogetsu Ikebana is a school of Japanese floral art that Leila describes as "avantgarde." It features the use of plant materials along with other items to creatively push the boundaries of traditional expression while adhering to strict principles of the art form. Leila and other students of Sensei Linda Hamasaki had their work displayed at an exhibition at Neiman Marcus on the weekend of



September 8-10. Leila had two featured arrangements—one created individually and one as a team (see photos). After viewing the location where their floral arrangements would be placed, the artists designed their work. Then after placement of the arrangements, store personnel added items that complimented and enhanced the floral display. 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Christy Kwok

Dr. Joseph Eppink

Our Director of Music & Organist was featured in a recent issue of *Hawai'i Business Magazine*—not for his organ playing but for his work as an end-of-life "death doula"! Having worked a number of years for hospice and having volunteered for hospice long before that, Joseph felt called to "grief work." In the last few years, he trained and became certified as a "death doula." Death doulas have three parts to their role as explained by Joseph—first, working with the family before the patient's death, through advanced directives on end-of-life care and by setting up

memorial services; second, being with the family during and after the patient's final moments, helping to wash and dress the body and providing support while waiting for the mortuary; and third, working with the family in addressing the grief journey. This last area is where Joseph spends most of his time. Joseph stresses that the grieving timeline is different for each person he coaches. The most rewarding part of the job, he said, is listening and connecting with people. "I love hearing their journeys, where they've been, what has made their life." BACPAC Prison Ministry

As part of the Diocesan Prison Ministry, they work to supply backpacks filled with essentials for those being released from prison, often with nothing but the clothes on their backs. St. Peter's goal is five filled backpacks every quarter. We are currently collecting for the fourth quarter backpacks. Each backpack contains the following:

Toiletries:

- Wash cloth (new or gently used)
- Body wash
- Deodorant
- Body Lotion
- Tooth paste/tooth brush
- Dental floss
- Band aids
- antiseptic ointment or cream

As a reminder, linens and water bottles may be gently used. Items can be dropped off Sundays at church or during the week in the church office. Monetary donations are also accepted. Packing of the fourth quarter backpacks will take place Saturday, October 14th, beginning at 11:00am. Wildfire Preparedness

In these past months we have tragically learned how devastating wildfires can be here in this state. What you may not know is that we have an organization on the Big Island dedicated to wildfire education and management. The Hawai'i Wildfire Management Organization has excellent resources to help you make your home and property more resistant to the impact of wildfires. Hawai'i: Your Personal Wildland Fire Action Guide." In exploring the website, you will also find an abundance of information regarding risk assessment around the state and what we can do to advocate for safer policies.

The Episcopal Diocese of Hawai'i Creation Care Task Force is coordinating Diocesan relief efforts on Maui through the Diocesan's already established "A Cup of Cold Water" (ACCW) ministry. Kōkua Mau - www.kokuamau.org

One of the community ministries this congregation supports is Kōkua Mau. Kōkua Mau means "Continuous Care" in Hawaiian and is an organization dedicated to providing care from this life through serious illness and death. As part of its educational mission, it makes available a host of resources for both those facing serious illness and their loved ones. Below are a few resources they highlighted in their last e-newsletter:

Dementia Care:

This summer the National Partnership for Healthcare and Hospice Innovation (NPHI), Aliviado Health, and Center to Advance Palliative Care (CAPC) released a new NPHI <u>dementia care resources guide</u>. The NPHI "Dementia Care Patient & Caregiver Resource Guide" is designed to support the home care of people living with dementia and to assist caregivers, including families, with the skills and necessary information to care for, manage safety, and provide comfort for their loved one living with dementia within their home.

The new Patient & Caregiver Guide represents the best standards of care for mid-, advanced-, to end-stage dementia and was put together with the collective input of 100+ not-for-profit hospice, palliative care, and advanced illness care organizations. It offers a detailed explanation of dementia, provides tips for symptom management, and offers resources for both patients and caregivers.
