Diocesan Education Day and Annual Convention, Friday, Oct. 22nd, and Saturday, Oct. 23rd


This was the second year during which we had a completely virtual Diocesan Education Day and Convention due to the pandemic.

The topic of Education Day was "Reconciliation" and featured presentations by Dr. Jonathan Okamura and Dr. Akiemi Glenn that provided both historical insight and challenge in calling us to consider the embedded impact of racism within Hawai'i and the resultant disparities in access to wealth, education, and power. During lunch Dr. Jon Osorio and his daughter, Dr. Jamaica Osorio, shared their mana'o and music. Discussion was begun in smaller break-out groups.

The topic of the Annual Convention on Saturday was "Remembering those who have gone before...." St. Peter's lay voting delegates were Joseph Eppink, Taka Kimura, Velma Lee, Nancy Rowe, and Tim Yuen. With almost 200 people participating, there were eight screens of "Hollywood Squares" faces in the Zoom meeting. Three of our delegates happened to be on this

screen. Can you find them?

Besides annual business issues and a fiscally responsible Diocesan budget clearly presented by our treasurer, Nancy Rowe, and another fellow treasurer, Tripp Lynch, both of whom serve on Diocesan Council, the most significant action was the passage of a resolution committing our Diocese and congregations to an acceleration and expansion in discussions and actions regarding the climate



crisis and global warming. At the heart of the resolution was a call for each congregation to form a "Green Team" with an "Environmental Coordinator" who will serve as a liaison to the Diocesan Creation Care and Environmental Justice Task Force. Konstantinos Karampakakis (10am worshiper) has volunteered to serve as St. Peter's "Environmental Coordinator." Might you consider serving on our congregation's Green Team? This is an issue of critical importance not only for us but for our children and grandchildren and the well-being of this earth which God has created. Please prayerfully consider this and speak with Pastor Diane and/or Konstantinos.

In addition, the resolution calls upon the Diocese to:

- provide grants to congregations to "green" their buildings and to help with the cost of energy audits
- ensure that the Diocese is following the "socially responsible guidelines of The Episcopal Church including non-investment in companies (and funds) where more than 10% of revenue is derived from fossil fuels," investing instead in renewable energy and carbon-free energy sources
- Acknowledge that human-caused climate change disproportionally affects those who are least responsible and have the least amount of power and resources to alter their circumstances
- Encourage all Episcopalians to advocate for state and national responses to the public health and existential crisis facing God's creation due to climate crisis and global warming





Diocesan Education Day and Annual Convention continues...

A rather perfunctory resolution to approve revisions to bring the Diocesan canons in line with the national church canons raised an interesting discussion around the increasing awareness of gender fluidity when a motion was made to add "they" to the list of he/she pronouns.

Taka Kimura wrote, "I was very impressed with how smoothly the whole Diocesan Convention went, thanks to the staff's fantastic prep work. The online forum still allowed great discussion and I was happy to see differing perspectives expressed openly and honestly without judgement or backlash. It was also great to have vote tallies reported almost instantaneously! I DO miss the interpersonal interaction that you get when attending a non-virtual convention and look forward to a time where we can all meet in person again!" A great summary, Taka! I think all of us who "attended" this virtual Convention felt the same way.

Besides the business of resolutions, the most meaningful part of the Convention were two presentations beautifully prepared by Sybil Nishioka, who handles Diocesan communications. The first was the visual necrology across the Diocese of those who have died since the start of the pandemic in March 2020 when funeral gatherings ceased, and the other was a celebration of the Diocesan Treasurer, Peter Pereira, who retired after 30 years of service to this Diocese. Both were heartfelt and touching. St. Peter's, along with all the congregations of this Diocese, have greatly benefited from Peter's faithful guidance over these decades, especially most recently in navigating our way through the financial challenges of the pandemic. We are grateful, and with one heart we all wished Peter much joy in his retirement.

Further Diocesan Convention Comments:

From lay voting delegate, Tim Yuen:

The second (and hopefully last) Virtual Diocesan convention due to COVID was a success from a technological and execution standpoint. The voting, and discussions went off without a hitch with very little, if any fumbling around. Recognition to our very own Nancy Rowe on an excellent Diocesan budget presentation, Rev Jazzy Bostock who led Friday's educational topic of reconciliation which dealt with race inequities of the past, and Rev. Annalise Pasalo who was the Secretary to Convention.

The entire convention was open to the public for viewing and the recording is still on the Diocesan web page. Bishop Bob as always gave a well presented address which is also on the recording.

From lay voting delegate, Nancy Rowe:

Not having participated in the virtual convention last year, I was intrigued at how well it actually worked. The Special Orders of Business videos were wonderfully well done. I hope that is a concept that is adopted going forward.

There was very little business beyond the mandatory elections, budget, and resolutions which made the meeting shorter than in-person. I participated in the Centering Prayer Breakout session during the lunch break. It was nice to connect with the facilitator, Lindy Marzo, who had been a regular at our Jazz Vespers. The disadvantage of a virtual convention is that the opportunity to renew old friendships and make new ones is not there. The advantage? Not looking for a parking spot.





From lay voting delegate, Velma Lee:

Disadvantages of a virtual meeting:

- ✓ We didn't get to see all the representatives of each church.
- ✓ We didn't get to participate in the in-person Eucharist at the Cathedral. I missed seeing all of the clergy process into and out of the Cathedral, everyone's awe-inspiring singing, and responses to God's words.
- We didn't get to give Peter Pereira a standing ovation in gratitude for his 30 years as our Treasurer. Three people have divided his responsibilities and there will be a rotating fourth volunteer to help oversee their work. Imagine that!

Advantages of a virtual meeting:

- Got up on time and had a leisurely paced breakfast.
- > No traffic to maneuver from Pearl City in to town and then look for a parking space.
- > We saved several trees because we could check the contents of the workbook online.




A book on St. Peter's stained glass windows is in the works!

BACPAC Prison Project

We had such a great response to our last backpack collection that Keisha Webster and Haroldwyn Chang, Coordinators for St. Peter's BACPAC Prison Project, have set a goal for five backpacks per quarter. About 40 backpacks are needed per month of which the The Prison Ministry of the Episcopal Diocese has committed to ten per month. These backpacks are filled with essential, basic supplies for men and women being released from prison, often with nothing but the clothes they are wearing. We are currently collecting supplies for the next round of five backpacks in December.

The general list is below. An updated list of the items still needed for the December backpacks is printed each week in the Sunday bulletin or can be obtained by calling the church office. Any extra supplies received from the list below will be used to fill backpacks in the next quarter. Linen items can be gently used.

General backpack list:

Large size backpacks or duffel bags

Body Care / Hygiene: Bar Soap; Tooth Brushes and Tooth Paste; Shampoo and Conditioner; Shaving Cream; Dental Floss; Body Lotion; Antiseptic Cream; Hair Brush / Comb; Deodorant; Disposable Razors; Nail Clippers; Facial Tissue; Band Aides

Linens: Bed Sheets (dbl. size); Pillow Case; Pillow; Bath Towel and Wash Cloth

Food: Cocoa Drink Mix / Hot Chocolate; Trail Mix Nuts; Cup of Noodles; Instant Coffee

Miscellaneous: Water Bottle Containers; Forks/Spoons (plastic); Toilet Paper; Detergent Pods; Writing

Tablet; Pen / Pencil.
