Senior Warden Corner: Velma Lee

The following are some highlights from the August Vestry meeting:

- > The Rally Day coffee hour between services and BBQ after the second service will be postponed until a future date, possibly in October.
- > Bishop Bob expects the current diocesan restriction against in-person indoor and outdoor coffee hour gatherings to continue at least through the end of September.
- > Online Sunday school is in the works for this fall.
- > An Evensong at the Cathedral has been discussed for October 10 to coincide with the recognition of Episcopal Schools and featuring an appeal for the St. Andrew's Square Scholarship.

Pending items include by-law revisions that add technology options currently being reviewed by the Diocese, the new steeple cross currently being manufactured, employee handbook updates, and a stained glass window book project.

Our Jr. Warden, Terry Dang, has been very busy accomplishing a long list of repair and maintenance items in church, Aloha Room, and Parish Hall.

Jr. Warden Corner: Terry Dang

A wireless doorbell was recently installed on the Parish Hall stairs for delivery personnel, but you're welcome to use it too if you need to get to the church office but find the stairs double doors locked. Push the button, the doorbell rings in the office then wait and see if anyone comes to open the door for you. If not try calling one of the phone numbers listed on the sign. Please remember that the office is closed on Wednesdays and open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 9am to 1pm.

You may have noticed that we're NOT running more than 5 A/C units in the sanctuary during the service. HECO sent us a letter to make us aware of a possible change from Rate Schedule "G" to Rate Schedule "J" when peak demand is greater than 25 Kilo Watts (KW) three times in a 12-month period. We are in the process of testing and troubleshooting our sanctuary A/C system with HECO because of recent peak demand KW usage. HECO tested our sanctuary A/C meter and found it to be working properly. They installed a data usage meter so it can show us date and time of peak demand KW usage during this next testing phase. We will be operating the units normally like we did 2 months ago so we can determine time of demand surge. HECO will waive the peak demand criteria during this phase. Your patience and understanding are appreciated during the troubleshooting and test phases.

Also, please let me know if you see any of our A/C units with a green blinking light as it may be indicating a possible problem with the unit.





Children's Christian Formation

Stephanie Wight from St. Peter's and Beth Young and Emily Jackson from the Cathedral are working on an online Children's Christian Formation program for this fall in collaboration with the Cathedral's media staff person. The aim of the program will be to enhance and encourage personal relationships with God using stories, music and prayer. Stephanie says of the program, "It will be geared to younger children, but will by no means be inappropriate for youth and adults with child-like hearts."

Your donation is tax deductible to the fullest extent of the law, but for your donation to appear on your church giving statement you must submit a copy of your receipt to our bookkeeper, Richert, in the church office. Foodland does not give us the names of donors. We thank Foodland and you for your support of St. Peter's through this matching program!

Personal and collective reflection, repentance and amendment of life are at the core of true reconciliation. How can I participate in making things right – pono – in my life, in my community, and in my Church? I think this is the most important Education Day in years. While I might dream that every Episcopalian in Hawai'i will participate, I know that is not practical. I do urge all Clergy and lay leaders (Delegates, Wardens, Vestry/Bishop Committee members, and Diocesan leaders) to attend."
